Remains found in Columbia landfill identified as Megan Shultz

The Columbia Police Department confirmed Friday the remains found in September at the Columbia landfill are "99.99%" those of missing Columbia woman Megan Shultz.

In a release, CPD said detectives submitted a DNA sample to a private lab for comparison to the human remains found on September 18th.

Shultz was reported missing in August of 2006 by her husband. At the time, police said a missing person report was completed, but there was no evidence suggesting foul play.

Authorities in Lake Geneva, Wisconsin said Comfort came to the city's police department, implicating himself in the disappearance and death of his former wife.

Court documents show Comfort told investigators he killed Shultz and then dumped her body in a city dumpster.

Comfort was eventually extradited to Boone County.

The information Comfort told authorities led CPD investigators and city leaders to conduct an exploratory dig at the Columbia landfill looking for dated and postmarked items close to the time of Shultz disappearance.

Investigators used that information to narrow down a smaller patch of landfill to search. On September 18th, CPD and city leaders confirmed they had found what they believed to be human remains were they were searching.
