

Remains found in Orange County identified as missing Jamaican man 9 years later

Skeletal remains recovered in Orange County in 2016 have been identified by detectives nine years later.

The only evidence detectives had to identify the individual was a set of keys that included two loyalty reward cards, one from Winn-Dixie and another from CVS.

Detectives sent subpoenas to the companies to gather details about the owner of the reward cards.

While they waited to hear back from the companies, detectives were able to obtain a composite sketch of what they believed the person looked like.

The sketch was then uploaded to multiple missing person databases.

Ocoee detectives said that through the use of Othram, a genetic genealogy company, the remains were identified as a Jamaican-born man.

After 18 months, the Winn-Dixie corporation provided detectives with the identity of the loyalty reward owner.

That information matched a missing person out of Orange County in 2013.

A phone number was obtained for the individual who reported him missing, identified as his son.

The remains were then identified as 89-year-old **Lloyd Williams**, according to detectives.

Williams was last seen at 5402 Blue Tick Drive in Orlando when he went missing in 2013.

His son traveled to Orlando and reported that his father's home appeared to have been "ransacked."

He also said that several valuable items were missing, including a television.

Detectives said the cause of death has been listed as suspicious.
